There are more than 20 important races and issues on your ballot this year. Though this guide does not encompass all races, **our success will be determined by those who vote their entire ballot. VOTE BY MAIL DATES

- It is critical that we vote early this year! Ballots are mailed on October 9th, look for them in your mailbox as soon as October 12th.
- Don't wait! Return your ballot as soon as possible by mail or at a drop box
- Because of potential delays with our postal service we strongly encourage voters to use a drop box to turn in your ballot. However, if you need to return it by mail, October 26th is the last day to mail your ballot to ensure that it is received in time to be counted.
- Ballots must be received by 7pm on November 3rd to be counted
- We would suggest signing up to receive ballot tracking information via email, text, or phone. You can do that here colorado.ballottrax.net

CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT 3

Colorado's 3rd congressional district makes up roughly half of the state and takes in most of the rural West Slope, southeast, and southern portions of the Eastern Plains. It includes the cities of Grand Junction, Durango, Aspen, Glenwood Springs, Montrose, Ouray, Pueblo, and much more. This large geography represents diverse communities including mountain towns that rely on tourism, agricultural communities, and smaller urban epicenters, each that fill out our economy with a unique niche to ensure the West Slope thrives. With a growing population of college students, an immigrant population that supports our ag sector, and a climate that attracts seniors, the West Slope is diverse and has a variety of needs to support our communities.

This seat was previously held by Representative Scott Tipton, a five-term Congressman. This is the first time in ten years that voters in the 3rd congressional district will have a choice between two new candidates without a choice to reelect an incumbent. This is the first year in history that the choice is between two female candidates.



DIANE MITSCH BUSH

Diane Mitsch Bush has lived and worked on the Western Slope for 43 years. Diane was raised by a single mother and earned her way to a Ph.D., serving as a professor in several Colorado universities and colleges. Diane was elected county commissioner in Routt County and for three terms in the State Legislature.

The West Slope and many of its rural communities have largely remained dependent on the extractive energies industry. But with natural gas and renewable energy overtaking the energy industry, western Colorado is being left behind and scrambling to keep up. Though each town is different, the desire to create diverse and resilient local economies across the region is a common need we all share. We asked the candidates what their plan or vision was for building more diverse and resilient local economies in Western Colorado.

LYNN PADGETT

In 2010 I convened and facilitated Ouray County's collaborative meetings to identify 5 county-wide economic goals, with an emphasis on diversifying our economy in harmony with our inherent strengths and values. We realized we had a high percentage of creatives in our County, but that wasn't their primary income generator. My plan is to convene our collaborative discussion to update our top 5 county-wide economic development goals. We need to celebrate our success in enhancing broadband, renewable energy, outdoor recreation, and our creative industries. We need to focus on continuing to diversify so that when there is a mining, construction, or real estate, bust that the negative impacts are buffered by strong economic activity in other sectors.

JAKE NIECE

Tourism is, and will likely remain, Ouray County's primary industry. But I am encouraged by the planned expansion of Ouray Silver Mine operations, and I would like to work on opportunities to attract responsible mining operations and ensure we have reasonable protections in place for preservation of our valuable high country (tourism is still #1), but that still allow profitable mining. Of particular interest is a probable future demand for rare earth metals contained in the San Juans that are necessary to manufacture electronics. And also finishing installation of fiber internet (this includes last mile and ISP service) so that we reach parity of bandwidth with the rest of the state and country. This will allow working remotely for professions that require high bandwidth, and for future opportunities we cannot yet anticipate.

BARBARA MCLACHLAN

On the ground level, we need to shop locally, keeping local dollars in the hands and businesses of local people. The REDI bill I sponsored this session has state money flowing to local governmental agencies to address specific economic needs in their own jurisdictions. I believe we need to keep focusing that money directly to local residents. I am a strong supporter of the Outdoor Recreation Industry because it is fairly consistent and provides year-round employment.
